This is my second year directing the program and I've made some efforts to address outstanding issues identified by my predecessors in past annual reports. With that in mind, I expect my assessment methods will continue to evolve in the coming years. In general, every AAS course requires students to write an original research paper that uses quality primary and secondary sources. This assignment is the best evidence students are meeting the program's core learning outcomes.

AAS 2000 students are asked to demonstrate their expanded knowledge of African American culture and history via a research paper using quality primary and secondary sources. The benchmark for success is to have at least 70% of the students earn a rubric equivalent score of a C or better. AAS 4900 students are tasked with applying the knowledge gained from their previous coursework via a service learning project at an institution that engages in work relevant to the minor's subject matter. Because this is a capstone project for graduating students, the benchmark for success for this metric is a 100% success rate.

7. **Results, Planned Actions, and/or Actions Taken** -Briefly summarize the assessment results, how they relate to benchmark(s), and how you are using them to enhance student learning and improve program quality.

A review of the student research papers from AAS 2000- Critical Perspectives in African American Studies and capstone projects from AAS 4900- Integrative Seminar shows the program is effectively meeting our outcomes. For the AAS 2000 course, over 90% of students who completed the research papers scored a B or better. The sole AAS 4900 capstone project for this year earned a perfect score.
